Moving Pictures

Still Film, a collection of eye-pulling pics showing at the Yukon Arts Centre from Mar. 24–May 21, investigates the storytelling potential of photographs.

Since Eadweard J. Muybridge snapped photos of a galloping horse and stitched them together back in the 1870s, proving once and for all that all four legs of a nag leave the ground when running, photographers have been playing with movement in pictures. *Still Film* explores photos that give viewers a sense of movement and provoke them to investigate the wary each tells: a blurred figure hanging from a cliff; a series of photos of a man rotating in his chair; a young woman in the throes of despair with a martini and a table of pills to console her.

The exhibit is part of the Yukon Arts Centre's rotating curating program that

invites leading arts authorities from around the country to curate a show in the YAC gallery.

While most of the guest curators come from the South, *Still Film* was curated by Lance Blomgren, director of the Klondike Institute of Art and Culture ODD Gallery in Dawson City and the only Yukoner chosen to curate a show. From his teeny, rural town, he assembled a worldly show from submissions gathered as faraway as Rotterdam, Paris, Frankfurt, and New York.
